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GIVE a man a fisi

"So, what does Tearfund do?" I get this question - or a form of it - quite a bit. Tearfund Ireland is a small organisation and, though we're known among churches, those outside the Christian community are not as aware of us. Recently, I attended a seminar with leaders from the corporate sector and, before the session began, a few of us introduced ourselves. That's when I was asked this question.

In the days before this event, the staff of Tearfund Ireland and I had been discussing different ways we could explain who we are and what we do in a way that helps people more easily understand the various aspects of our work. So, sparked with a moment of divine creativity, I shared with my fellow seminar participants a version of the fish analogy to explain what we do.

You're more than likely familiar with the analogy, 'Give someone a fish, they're fed for a day. Teach someone how to fish, they're fed for a lifetime.'

Reminding my new friends of this analogy, I explained the three pillars of Tearfund Ireland:

- Humanitarian Relief
- Sustainable Development
- Biblical Justice.
- 1. When we give relief in response to a disaster, we're giving someone a fish.
- 2. When we undertake the longer-term work of Sustainable Development, we're helping someone learn how to fish (notice I did not say 'we teach' someone how to fish).
- We engage in the work of Justice by helping remove the barriers which prevent someone from being able to fish.

Following that short description, the business leaders in the room responded with excitement, saying things like, 'I've never understood the difference between relief and development, but that explanation makes it very clear.'

These three pillars are distinct but interrelated and, for Tearfund Ireland to fulfil our mission, we need each to function. In an emergency or disaster, people have an urgent need for something tangible. Giving someone a tent, food parcel or hygiene kit is a compassionate, practical response to need. But if all our activity were to be based on aid distribution, we would not be providing long-term solutions.

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Sustainable development is the more intentional work of helping people overcome the challenges in their own context, helping them build resilience and become less reliant on external aid. This requires longer-term commitment, substantial investment, and meaningful relationships with local partners.

In our engagement with local partners, we learn about the obstacles they face in trying to bring about change in their country or region. In any given culture, a worldview is often prevalent which prevents those who are vulnerable and marginalised from creating change on their own. Quite often, people need someone else to speak up – to advocate – with them or on their behalf. This is the work of justice.

A distinctive of Tearfund Ireland is our belief that the Church has a unique role to play in all three aspects of this work. Psalm 89:4 says that justice and righteousness are the foundation of God's throne. This is an important truth. As the Church engages in compassionate aid, long-term efforts to facilitate holistic transformation, and speaking out against systemic injustice, we bear witness to the character of God and demonstrate the nature of his reign.

The impact of broken relationships

Poverty is complex and exists in many forms. Most people tend to think of poverty in material or economic terms. But there is spiritual poverty, emotional poverty and social poverty to name a few. All these forms of poverty are present in the multiple difficulties facing the world. At Tearfund Ireland, we see it all the time:

- We see it in places devastated by disasters.
- We see it where people are being displaced from their homes (because of conflict, drought, or crop failures).
- We see it when parents are forced to send children away to fend for themselves.
- We see it in the disease and poor living conditions in which millions of people attempt to survive.
- We see it in the ravages of climate challenges.
- We see it in the inequality and inequity of our world.
- We see it in communities experiencing extreme poverty.

All forms of poverty stem from broken relationships.

Broken relationships between ourselves and God certainly, but also our relationship with self, with our fellow humans and with the whole of creation. We know that God didn't intend this brokenness. His desire is for reconciliation, restoration, and the nature of His kingdom to be demonstrated throughout the earth.

At Tearfund Ireland, we believe all people have been created in the image of God and, because of that, all people have dignity and value. Further, we believe, all people are uniquely gifted and able to bring a creative expression to the challenges they face. With this understanding, we aim to facilitate opportunities for people to become incredible change-makers and lift themselves out of poverty for good. Recognising that the source of poverty is broken relationships, we aim for holistic transformation of individuals and entire communities by demonstrating the goodness, love, and justice of God.

That's why we do what we do. We know that God's desire is not for people to remain in poverty. He came to make all things new. Our vision is for flourishing communities, free from poverty and injustice. We believe this is what God wants for all His children and we're working alongside the Church towards the restoration of relationships and holistic transformation of all people.

Here is the story of a dog named Rocky. Rocky used to live in Ukraine. She made it to safety when her owner, Katarina* grabbed her one day and took her on a crammed train to the border. After a lengthy and arduous journey across the border, Rocky and Katarina now live with a host family in Slovakia, who have a 12-year-old daughter called Kasia* – and a dog! Every day, Rocky goes on a walk with Katrina, Kasia, and Kasia's dog. The daily walks are helping them all become friends. Kasia has been learning English, but, until these daily walks, has never had the courage to practice out loud. But now, Kasia converses with Katarina and then shares what she learns with her parents so they can support Rocky and Katarina in the best way possible.

Since the end of February, the conflict in Ukraine has continued and millions have fled their homes. Over six million have left for a bordering country and seven million are internally displaced. Our prayers are with all those who are facing an uncertain future – removed from their homes, their families, their livelihoods, their everyday normality.

Throughout the Ukraine conflict, we have partnered with Integra in Slovakia to provide food, shelter and essentials for those most vulnerable in Ukraine. A large container, filled with an average of 26 metric tons of non-perishable food items and essentials, was delivered to Ukraine in May and distributed to 6,000 people. Additionally, our local partner has been providing overnight accommodation to Ukrainian refugees as well as medicine and medical supplies, a cash-transfer programme, and trauma counselling. None of this would have been possible without you. We are deeply grateful for your compassionate generosity that will help some of those most vulnerable.

Please pray

As we know from our experience in supporting Syrian refugees, the impact of this conflict will be life-altering. We are praying for peace – that 'the peace of God, which surpasses all understandings' (Philippians 4:7) will guard the hearts and minds of all those impacted by this conflict. We ask that you continue pray with us for the people of Ukraine as well as others around the world who are facing challenges that most of us in Ireland cannot comprehend.

Horn of Africa

Can you imagine if the entire country of Ireland was facing drought conditions, leading to little access to food and water? And can you imagine if it wasn't just the size of Ireland but five times its size? When drought occurs, most people must leave their homes in search of food and water—limiting their access to health services, making women and children more vulnerable, and causing children to miss school.

That scenario seems impossible for us here in rain-soaked Ireland. But it's a deep and challenging reality for the easternmost region of Africa, an area larger than Germany, France, Spain and Italy combined. With the absence of several rainy seasons, there are now more than 20 million people facing the worst drought in 40 years. And it's predicted that next year's rains will fail to appear too. As clean water dries up and food becomes scarce, diseases such as cholera and diarrhoea increase, and livestock are dying. On top of this, the dire situation is further exacerbated by locust invasions, extreme climate challenges, conflicts and rising fuel and food costs.

An emergency response

Tearfund Ireland, in partnership with Tearfund Germany, were able provide vulnerable communities in Somaliland with access to water, hygiene and sanitation. Since the local partners started working with 750 vulnerable households across four communities, no disease outbreaks or livestock deaths have been reported despite the severity of the droughts. So far, the communities working with local partners have been able to avert famine.

Father-of-four Omar, aged 29, experienced first-hand the hardship of life without water. 'The situation is very hard for us,' he says. 'Without enough water, life is difficult. The only thing we could think about was getting the amount of water we needed to cook food. There wasn't enough for any other purposes. We did not clean our clothes and our personal hygiene was challenged.'

Since our partner's water distribution began, his family has received 45 litres each day. He says, 'We appreciate the water supplied by Tearfund. We no longer have trouble getting water. We can drink clean water, cook food, wash our clothes and focus on hygiene and sanitation.'
